## Authors' response: exposing children to secondhand smoke

Pool and colleagues make an important point about exposure to tobacco smoke¹ but we are uncertain of the relevance to our paper,² which reported the effects of smoking by parents as a behaviour rather than source of passive exposure. While we cannot discount the possibility that children of smokers are more likely to become smokers as a consequence of passive smoke exposure, our interpretation is that it is the behaviour that is responsible.
